Gaming Trust – Guide for MNZ Affiliated Clubs

Motorcycling New Zealand has prepared this information for our Affiliated Clubs to assist in applying for funding.

We endeavour to list some of the things that the Community Gaming Trusts will consider when assessing an application for example the status and finances of a sports club.

Community Gaming Trusts can only fund:

- Amateur sports clubs
- Sports clubs affiliated with a national sporting organisation
- Clubs participating in a recognised sports competition

Community Gaming Trusts will not fund:

- Individual Sports people directly
- Projects that have already been completed
- Professional Sport
- Refreshments, catering and bar staff
- Cash prizes



Projects that may receive funding

Clubs & Club facilities

- Purchase land and/or buildings
- Develop facilities
- Maintain facilities
- Grounds maintenance
- Utilities (power & phone)
- Lease/rent
- Vehicles (not for commercial or personal use)
- Advertising
- Administration Costs
- Salaries

Events

- Costs around participation at International events
- Costs around participation at National events
- Prizes (small non cash prizes)
- Trophies
- First Aid

Coaching & Development

- Sport Development
- Coaching Programmes
- Playing Uniforms
- Equipment



What the Trusts take into consideration

Status of Sports Club:

- Amateur Club
- Incorporated Society
- Affiliated to a National Sporting Organisation
- Competes in recognised competition
- Age of the Club (at least one year old)

Finances of the Sports Club:

- Percentage of costs that the Club will put towards the project
- Is the Club in a position to pay for the project itself
- Financial Viability
- Does the Club have a long term lease or tenure
- Ownership of assets by the Club
- Has the Club received funding from the trust in the past
- Is the Club applying for funding from other trusts

Evidence from the Club:

- Evidence of the Club Committee supporting the funding application

About the Club & Application:

- Does the Club share the Trusts goals
- Is the Club located within the local area of the gaming machines operating
- Has the Club reported as required on previous funding
- Is the application for services or facilities that already exist in the community
- Has the project go clear outcomes that can be measured
- Has the Club completed a risk assessment of the project
- Will the money be spent within six months of being granted

You will need to ensure that you refer to the authorised purpose of the funding of each individual trust's website.

Every year the NZCT give millions of dollars in grants to thousands of applicants from a huge range of sport groups. NZCT are proud to be New Zealand's biggest funder of amateur sport.

Grants: Every year, NZCT give millions of dollars in grants to thousands of applications. While sport is the NZCT primary focus, the NZCT also provide funds for charitable purposes such as rescue and life-saving services, education, health, the arts, cultural and community groups.

Grants for Sport: Grants will only be made to support amateur sport. By this the NZCT mean any amateur sporting activity, organisation or club that is:

- Affiliated to Sport NZ recognised National body; and
- Genuine and real (has standards, rules etc); and
- Played on a regular basis as part of a significant competition; and
- Open to public membership

Most expense items necessary to play sport, apart from those of a personal nature, will be considered. This includes: uniforms, ground maintenance, sports equipment, first aid kits and coaching.

Funding Rounds: You can send your grant application to NZCT at any time. The Committee meets regularly to review applications and make funding decisions. THE NZCT recommend organisations complete their applications at least six to eight weeks before funding is required.

About Pub Charity : Pub Charity is a Charitable Trust and is focussed on supporting communities all over New Zealand. Pub Charity makes a huge difference to a wide range of local cases each year by returning millions of dollars in gaming machine proceeds to New Zealand communities.

Pub Charity target a return of 95% of available donation funds right back into the community where they were raised. Meaning gaming machines in Pub Charity venues support their local communities.

Grants: Examples of community groups and organisations that receive support from Pub Charity include:

- Education
- Emergency Services
- Health
- Sports
- Community

Grants for Sport: Approximately 33% of Pub Charity donations are made to the community through sport.

Funding Rounds: The Pub Charity Net Proceeds Committee meets once a month to assess donation applications (excluding December).

Applications must be submitted by the schedule closing date to be included for consideration, applications are encouraged to be placed early so any queries can be clarified prior to closing date.

About Southern Trust: From its modest beginnings in Dunedin in 1998, the Southern Trust has grown to be one of the top 5 gaming trusts in the country.

Grants: The Southern Trust strive to return as much as possible to communities through funding. The Southern Trust provide funding to amateur sport, education, community purposes, welfare organisations and arts and culture. The majority of families within New Zealand have received benefit, either directly or indirectly, from gaming proceeds through the Southern Trust funding, which support a huge diversity of organisations and communities.

Grants for Sport: Grants must only be made for amateur sport. Most kinds of funding for amateur sports are permissible. You can pay for playing uniforms (but not dress uniforms), grounds maintenance, equipment, coaching – in short, anything that is necessary in order to play the sport. Grants should be made to the national organisation or an affiliated club, not to individuals.

Professional sports are not authorised purposes, except where a professional is involved in coaching, training or development for junior sport. Funding could be made for short term coaching courses, not a full-time salary.

To ensure that the sport group has bona fide credentials, teams or individuals that benefit from funding should be affiliated to a recognised national organisation. Funding made to non-affiliated “social” sports clubs (such as corporate leagues) are not deemed to be an authorised purpose as membership in these teams is not open to the general public.

The definition of a “bona fide sport” that is approved by the department is a sporting activity, organisation or club that is:

- affiliated or aligned to a national body; and
- genuine and real (has standards and rules etc.); and
- played on a regular basis as part of a significant competition; and
- open to public membership

Funding Rounds: The Southern Trust is always open for applications, they do not have any cut off dates. In most cases, applications are processed within 20 working days. Requests larger than \$30,000 are reviewed at the next available monthly Board of Trustees meeting.

About The Trusts Charitable Foundation: The Trusts Charitable Foundation is a national not for profit company primarily established to distribute funds generated from Class 4 gaming machines operated in some Licencing Trusts outlets, privately owned Hotels and a Bowling Club throughout New Zealand.

Grants: The Trusts Charitable Foundations' missions is to provide funding for a wide range of clubs, charities and community groups – in fields as diverse as sport, arts, culture, health and education.

Grants for Sport: To be eligible for funding, you should have Charitable Status issued by the Charities Commission, if you do not have Charitable Status you must check the Trusts Charitable Foundation website, you will also need:

- Proof of current affiliation to a national or regional body
- Proof/itinerary and dates of events for which funding is sought
- Names and roles of individuals in the team/organisation if travel funding is being requested

Funding Rounds: The Trusts Charitable Foundation holds 11 funding rounds per annum, they close as follows; 01 March 2013; 10 April 2013; 10 May 2013; 10 June 2013; 10 July 2013; 10 August 2013; 10 September 2013; 10 October 2013; 10 November 2013.
